Programme

MPhil in Anthropology

It normally takes two years (full-time) to complete 28 units. Students must also pass a General Anthropology Examination based on a department reading list.

PhD in Anthropology

The programme is research-oriented. A student may be asked to take additional courses or tutorials, and will be required to present an annual written progress report to his/her supervisor. For advancement to PhD, a candidate must submit a Research Proposal for a nine to twelve month period of fieldwork. On return from fieldwork, the student will prepare a thesis based on fieldwork research.

MPhil in Anthropology

Applicants should have majored in anthropology or related fields.

PhD in Anthropology

Applicants should possess a master's degree in anthropology from CUHK or other recognized universities. Applicants with a background in fields other than anthropology may be considered for conditional admission.

Additional Application Information

Applicants are required to furnish proof of their research capability by submitting academic references, transcripts, samples of writings or publications such as thesis or project reports, and a statement of purpose (2-3 pages) describing why the applicant wants to study anthropology at CUHK and what research project the applicant proposes to carry out. If relevant for research, some evidence of Chinese proficiency is also required for non-native speakers.

MPhil in Chinese Language and Literature

The MPhil programme requires a total minimum of 27 credit hours of course work including the following courses: (1) Seminar; (2) Special Topics; and (3) Research Methods, plus a thesis.

PhD in Chinese Language and Literature

The programme is research-oriented. All doctoral students have to attend seminars within the normative study years and take four to six courses.

If the Division deems it necessary, some students may be required to take a course on a language other than English and Chinese and meet any further requirements laid down by the Division.

Students are required to fulfil the qualifying examination requirement before they can submit their dissertations.

The student will write his/her dissertation under the guidance of his/her supervisor.

MPhil in English (Applied English Linguistics)

Students are required to take four required courses, two elective courses & research methods. In addition, students shall write a research thesis which should make original contributions to Applied English Linguistics.

PhD in English (Applied English Linguistics)

Students are expected to have a good command of English, the official language of the thesis. Students must pass a qualifying examination within a specified period of time before they can be advanced to PhD candidature.

Applicants should normally possess an honours degree in English or a language-related field. Applicants with a good honours degree in subjects other than English may also be considered. All applicants must satisfy the Graduate Panel that they have an adequate standard of English and have a strong interest in Applied English Linguistics. Applicants should also have a strong research interest in Applied English Linguistics. A year (or more) of relevant professional experience is helpful.

PhD in English (Applied English Linguistics)

Applicants should have majored in Linguistics, or a language-related field. Applicants who do not hold a Master's degree awarded by this University or a recognized university are required to have completed the first-year course of study of the Master's programme before they are considered for admission. MPhil in English (Literary Studies) / PhD in English (Literary Studies)**Code: ELS****Programme****MPhil in English (Literary Studies)**

For both options in Literary Studies (English Studies and Comparative Literature / Cultural Studies), the course of study requires a normative period of two years to complete.

Coursework includes required and elective courses in research methodology, comparative literature, genre studies, literary history, critical theory, and interdisciplinary studies.

Students with advanced qualifications or demonstrated abilities may be considered for exemption from part of the coursework.

PhD in English (Literary Studies)

Unless exemption is granted study of a language other than Chinese and English is required at the third-year level. Students must pass a qualifying examination within a specified period of time before they can be advanced to PhD candidature.

Candidacy Examination

PhD students (pre-candidacy) should complete all required lecture courses or equivalent and pass a candidacy examination before they can be advanced to PhD candidate. Details of the candidacy examination are as follows:

Areas of Examinations

- Paper 1: Connoisseurship and analysis of original works of art
- Paper 2: Written examination on specific issues of Chinese Art

Attempts

Students must pass both papers at the same time. They are allowed to take the examination on specific issues only one more time if they fail their first attempt.

Thesis proposal and defence

PhD students (pre-candidacy) are required to submit a written thesis proposal, and present and defend the proposal orally.

Third Language Requirement

Students are required to have the ability to read research materials in a third modern language other than Chinese and English. To demonstrate their proficiency for this purpose, they must pass a relevant language test set by the Division.

The postgraduate programmes of PhD in History and MPhil in History are research oriented higher degree programmes offered by the Graduate Division of History to provide qualified students with rigorous academic training of advanced world levels.

MPhil in History / PhD in History

MPhil in History

Students are required to complete at least 24 units (for full-time students) / 30 units (for part-time students) of courses and the MPhil thesis, and to pass the oral examination for graduation.

PhD in History

Students are required to complete at least 33 units (for full-time students) / 39 units (for part-time students) of courses. They are also required to study a third language, other than Chinese and English, with satisfactory result. Students who have completed a total of 12 units of courses (besides "Thesis Guidance") shall take and pass an oral qualifying examination before advancement to the PhD candidature. PhD candidates should complete the PhD thesis and pass the oral examination for graduation.

 - iii. In the case of English, applicants from non-English-speaking countries are required to submit TOEFL scores. Those from English-speaking countries should submit SAT or GCE results instead.
 - II. Second Language Requirement:
 - i. It may be any Asian or Western language which is closely related to the intended fields of study; and
 - ii. Applicants must provide adequate evidence of proficiency in that language such as TOEFL scores, public examination results or academic records.
3. An interview may be required by the Division.

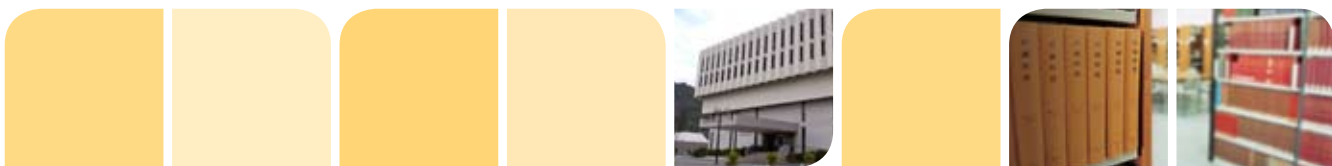

Third Language Requirement

Students are required to complete a minimum of 9 units of language courses (other than Chinese and English). Subject to the approval of the Division, credits gained for appropriate language courses at other institutions may be recognized.

Coursework

In addition to the 9 units of third language courses, students are required to take courses in three years. In the first two years of their study, students shall complete at least 11 units of graduate courses, which include "Research Methodology Seminar I & II," "Guided Study" and "Special Seminar on Selected Philosophical Issues (twice)."

Students not already possessing degree in philosophy may be required to take additional units if deemed necessary. Students shall meet their supervisors regularly for academic discussion and progress report.

Thesis

Students are required to take 6 units of thesis writing courses in the third year of their study and complete a PhD thesis with substantial contribution to scholarship.

MPhil in Philosophy

Coursework

Students are required to take 23 units of courses in two years, including "Research Methodology Seminar I & II," "Guided Study," "Special Seminar on Selected Philosophical Issues (twice)" and 6 units of thesis writing courses.

Students not already possessing degree in philosophy may be required to take additional units if deemed necessary. Students shall meet their supervisors regularly for academic discussion and progress report.

Thesis

Students are required to take 6 units of thesis writing courses in the second year of their study and complete a Master's thesis.

They will meet regularly with their supervisor(s) for discussions on their research topic. They must pass a qualifying examination, complete a dissertation and go through an oral examination. The Division may also require students to take additional courses if necessary.

Students must pass the qualifying examination within three years (four years for part-time students) before they can be promoted to PhD candidature. After passing the qualifying examination, candidates will proceed to complete their theses.
